Using Detail to Describe the Atmosphere Activity Sheet

I can practise and use the features of descriptive scene setting to enhance my writing.

The more detail you use in your descriptions, the clearer the picture will be in your reader's head and the more effectively you will communicate the atmosphere of the scene to the reader. This doesn't mean that you need to describe absolutely everything in your story in the utmost detail but practising using significant amounts of detail will help you remember that your reader is relying on you to create the picture they need.

A. Look at the description below and then see if the level of detail provided helps you draw the object in the blank space provided.
